He was passionate about the parallel of affordability and quality. He was very much about creating a better experience for the people he was designing for. He built things like clinics, hospitals, schools and neighborhoods. Essentials that everyone needs.

Part one of this project goes over the personal life of Sternberg and a selection of his most impactful/ well known works. I have chosen projects that show the style and passions that Sternberg had. These projects define who Eugene Sternberg was an architect and planner but he is not limited to just these.

When starting this project, I realized nowhere is there a place that lists all of the work that he has done. He has no compilation of his work, no portfolio that is available to the public. This sparked my Part two of my project. Using many different resources, I compiled a spreadsheet with all of the projects that I came across and the information I could find about it. I did the best I could and used my best judgement to fill out the spreadsheet as accurately as possible. I hope to continue this and confirm my findings when things start to open up again. Many sources say he did around 400 projects but my spreadsheet only has 195 projects that I could find. I am hoping this is a good place to start.

PART ONE

Eugene Sternberg Bio

Eugene Sternberg was not a vain man when it came to his work as an architect. His goal was to create functional and financially realistic structures for the good of the general public. Over the course of his 40 year career he was a part of over 400 buildings across Colorado, Nebraska, Montana,

Wyoming, New Mexico, Wisconsin and even Canada. Through all of his years of work he has proven to be more than just an architect but a planner and landscape architect as well.

Born in Bratislava, Czechoslovakia, Sternberg was exposed to the European style of buildings. Initially, Sternberg pursued his education at Cambridge in England when World War II hit. He was forced to take a part time teaching job while completing his degree at Technion in Prague. When the war was over, Sternberg was recruited by Sir Abercrombie where he was able to rebuild the houses in London that were destroyed during the German bombings in 1940.

In 1945, like many European architects, Sternberg and his young fiancé Barbra immigrated to America. In order to assure his place in the states, he was required to have proof of employment for at least three years. He accepted a teaching job at Cornell University in New York.

However, it didn't take long for Sternberg to announce he was dissatisfied with the lack of creativity that the architectural school provided. He left Cornell and accepted an offer to teach at the new architectural school as the first faculty member at the University of Denver School of Architecture.

Sternberg had his architecture license from Great Britain but he was required to get his license in order to practice in Colorado. This was a challenge since English was his 3rd language.

For the first time in his life, he took a plane with his wife and 6 week old to Denver Colorado. They resided in a faculty house at the school. There he taught and fell in love with the state of Colorado.

Unfortunately, the architecture school eventually closed and Sternberg was forced to find another project to put his energy into. He chose to focus on his own firm. One of the most noble things about Sternberg, was the buildings he chose to build. He chose projects like medical facilities, churches and elderly homes. He did not lack humility or the pride that so many in his field overflowed with.

Eventually, fortunately for the town, Sternberg found himself in the town of Littleton. There he was the first architect to establish a practice there. He designed the majority of his buildings in the community and was an active participant. Each addition hung on to the original historic town and each new building provided functionality and attractiveness.

One cannot deny that Sternberg's determination paid off to all the people that could not afford to live in brand new homes. He broke relationships with his inability to

settle for less than the best. His distinct style will always be a representation of the strides and accomplishments of Sternberg. Even when he retired in Evergreen, he wrote and spoke to affordable housing. He died at the age of 90 with a legacy that will be in the hearts of the people he helped.

Housing

One of Eugene Sternberg's primary focus was neighborhoods and affordable housing. Each neighborhood's style was perfectly suited for its location. Denver housing suburbs boomed in 1952 with close to 10,000 homes scheduled to be built in the next year. He saw the need for quality, affordable housing and helped Denver during these times. With his background he could bring new thoughts and technology to the table. He was quick but detailed in his designs. He knew Colorado would continue to grow and tried to help communities prepare accordingly.

He believed that homes were like people and needed community. In all of his communities, he designed curved streets to slow and discourage traffic. This made the neighborhoods safer and quieter. He tried his best to incorporate green space of some sort into each housing development.

Arapahoe Acres:

Arapahoe Acres is one of Sternberg's most well known and influential projects. It was one of the first things he was a part of after coming to

Colorado. He was not on

the project for very long but designed the plan for the neighborhood as well as 20 modern movement style homes in the area, mostly on Maron Street.

Edward Hawkins, the developer, purchased the 30 acre area in the late 1940's. Sternberg was recommended to Hawkins to be the architect/ planner for this post war domestic subdivision because of his passion around affordability and social design. Denver was in desperate need for housing post WWII. People were coming home and ready to start new lives. Construction was encouraged and many materials that were used for the war were now being used for domestic single family housing. The development started in 1949 and was completed in 1957.

Sternberg was very passionate about affordable housing and creating a diverse range of homes. He brought new technology from London like cavity brick walls, radiant heated floors and acoustic ceilings that were new to this area. There was a lot of variety in the homes creating a neighborhood with character. Each one of his homes

were individually designed very carefully. Each home varied in size, price, amenities and landscaped area. People were able to choose things like roof form, colors, and other design elements. These homes sold before they were even marketed. People were ecstatic that technology that used to be only used for the rich was now affordable.

Sternberg went against the traditional ways of planning a neighborhood. Instead of making the landscape flat with very straight streets he incorporated the sloped landscape to his advantage. From east to west, the subdivision sloped about 40 feet. Sternberg used this and rotating the houses slightly to create privacy. While the neighborhood does not have sidewalks, Sternberg curved the streets to discourage

traffic and create a safer neighborhood.

Just as fast as Sternberg and Hawkins collaboration started, it ended just as

quickly. After the project started to take off, Hawkins got greedy and started

selling the property for more than it was designed for and what Sternberg agreed

to. Sternberg realized Hawkins was more

concerned with money than he was about affordable housing. 20 of Sternberg's houses were complete before this split took place.

A year later, Hawkins hired Joseph Dion and Stanley Yoshimura as designers on the project. Hawkins also took it upon himself to design. You can differentiate what structures are Sternberg's designs vs Dion, Yoshimura, and Hawkins with the style.

Sternberg's style is related more to international while the others relate more to the union style.

This was the first post WWII, residential subdivision to be listed on the national register as a historic district in 1998. The area as a whole includes 122 contributing homes and 2 non contributing homes.

Mile High Cooperative:

Mile High Cooperative also known as south Dehlia Lane, was designed by Sternberg right after he left the partnership with Edward Hawkins on Arapahoe Acres. He took a similar approach to planning Mile High as he did with Arapahoe Acres but less diverse housing options. Sternberg took the opportunity to incorporate the design and planning qualities that he planned for Arapahoe Acres but didn't get the chance to.

This included more parks and outdoor areas. This community was a single loop with a central park in the middle for the neighborhood to enjoy. The park had an open air amphitheater and a playground. This was built around the baby boom era so this was the perfect creation for families.

This housing development was well known mostly because it was the first development to participate in the post war housing program low cost loans for families. 32 homes were built under the same 40 year mortgage. A group of university faculty members put their money together in order to build these homes for their families. Because not one house belonged to one family, families would move around in order to accommodate changing sizes of families. This unique financing plan ended in 1989 and now the residents in the neighborhood all own their own homes.

Orchard Hills:

Another housing development that he worked on was Orchard Hills. Located in the Greenwood village area. The site plan he did was a great plan but the modern homes didn't outlast time like some other communities he was a part of. This community was known for having lots of interconnected walking paths and a lake for the 150 acre community. Within this community, Sternberg designed seven picturesque homes. The design for this neighborhood was slightly different than anything else in the area with 6 groups of homes known as villages with a total of 150 homes in the

development. This was one of the nicer areas in the Denver area and the nicest that Sternberg did.

Geneva Village:

Geneva Village is a very interesting housing complex built in 1964. The village was originally built for retired members of the Geneva Association and contained 28 apartments designed by Sternberg. The Geneva Association was a fraternal group for hotel and restaurant male employees. Before the apartments were built, the Geneva

Association bought this land, that was known as Romoco Poultry Farm, and built a retreat for former hotel and restaurant employees in 1927. The house was known as the Geneva Lodge. It was seen as a perfect place for people to recover from

tuberculosis. Over the next forty years, new buildings were built as additions to the existing building to accommodate for growing numbers of retired members who needed assistance.

In 1975, the City of Littleton bought the apartment complex and the structures became part of the South Metro Housing options. Currently, the city has talked about what the future looks like for these buildings. They are not in the best shape and the low rent will not cover the work that needs to be done. It is being called a “critical problem”.

Schools

Ames Elementary:

Ames Elementary was an elementary school in Littleton, Colorado originally designed by Earl C. Morris in 1963. The school was home to an average of 230 students from grades pre-k to fifth. In 1975, Eugene Sternberg did a small addition to the elementary school, adding a 1475 square foot media room and a new kindergarten room. The school closed in 2010 and is now referred to as the Ames Facility. It is used for community events now.

Arapahoe Community College:

AAC is a Littleton masterpiece and arguably Sternberg's best work. The idea of a Community College in Littleton started in the early 1900's but didn't come to fruition until a vote from the town in 1964. The school started at the elementary school before a viable site was found for the main campus. The brutalist building was completed in 1975 at 197,000 square feet and an addition was added shortly in 1977 adding 84,000 square feet.

While Sternberg and the state of Colorado considered many sites and designs, ultimately a mega structure was built on 51 acres of land a few blocks from Littleton's Main Street. This site was desirable because of the big existing trees on the site. His master site plan was incredibly detailed to show every tree and existing building on the site. Sternberg's design preserved the trees on the site while having enough space for parking.

While there are many opinions on this big concrete structure, he believed that keeping the campus to one building would encourage students and professors to interact more. When designing, He planned for the future by making sure additions could be added and each space was flexible. His goal was to create a mini community within a larger community. He kept as many trees as possible to create a community park with lots of shade so people would want to hang out there. He felt that the college

would benefit from the community and vice versa.

Heritage High School:

While Heritage High School is a well known Sternberg brutalist building, there is not much information on it. The site was selected

in 1967 and five years later the new high school was built. Additions were added to it in the late 1980's but Sternberg was not the architect.

Pantall Elementary School:

This school is located in Sterling Colorado and was built in 1953. Post WWII the town of Sterling started growing, like most towns around Denver. The current schools were unable to serve the amount of students it needed so decided to build a new one. Sternberg collaborated with Robert J Murrin, a local architect, on the design and Craftsman Construction Company built it.

The construction took almost a year facing some challenges. When the structural footing was poured, they failed because of bad soil. An engineer named Nat Sachter was brought on to the project to test the soil. Better soil was found about 50 feet from the previous site so plans were reconfigured slightly then construction started again.

There were some additions to it in the mid 1970's but Sternberg was not a part of them. The school sadly closed in 2007.

Littleton

Courthouse Professional Building:

This is one of Sternberg's more colorful expressionist modern style buildings. He built this building for Martin

Miller who was a former colleague from DU and friend. Sternberg also housed his offices there for some time. Both of the men and their wives were friends who shared the same values around social justice and were active in the Littleton community. The Courthouse was adjacent to the building and as it expanded, staff of the courthouse approached Sternberg asking to use some space. Slowly Sternberg and Miller moved out and the Courthouse took over.

Trudell Professional Offices:

Trudell Professional offices, also known as The Gallup Building, was a post World War II building originally designed for dentist Dr. Neil M. Trudell. It was located down the street near the Arapahoe County Courthouse. It fell under the most important of all the professional buildings. The building was built in 1961, and Dr. Trudell occupied the building until 1976. After him Dr. Edward G. Anderson and dentist George C. Moore were occupants of the building. This building was given the feel of a residence because it was originally meant for the Arapahoe Acres nearby. This building was similar to the design plans of the Mile High Cooperative in Denver.

Steamboat

While Sternberg was known as a Denver architect and did a lot in Littleton, he also did some notable work in Steamboat too. He commuted from Denver to Steamboat regularly. The new Steamboat planning commission hired Sternberg to be a planning consultant and architect for the town. The city of Steamboat wanted to hire Sternberg as a part of their City Beautification Plan but had to put a lot of thought into it because of his rates.

Sternberg loved Steamboat and has been known to say it has “rugged God given beauty”. He was excited to be on the planning commission and felt that this area had a lot of overlooked potential. Steamboat was a very prosperous happy town that adored Eugene Sternberg.

Steamboat Apartments are also known as Hillcrest Apartments are one of Eugene Sternberg more well known works. They were constructed in 1958 and contracted by W.L. Pierce. Sternberg and Pierce were both thought of fondly in the Steamboat society so their collaboration caused lots of excitement in the small town.

The Hillcrest Apartments were a great example of the modern Usonian style. There were two separate one story apartments and a detached garage. The buildings had great evergreen trees and other luscious greenery that complemented the location of the apartments. Between that, the enormous views, and the progressive style, these structures were considered quite luxurious.

Each apartment was very modest and reasonable for the nature of the families that resided in them. They included a small kitchen, a family room, a small hallway, two bedrooms, a bathroom and, as of recently, an attached garage.

These apartments are a large piece of evidence that portrays the work that Sternberg was putting into affordable housing. Unfortunately these apartments have not held on to their creators' wishes and have skyrocketed their prices because Sternberg's work is well known and Steamboat is a very expensive mountain town. In 2011, it was listed on the National Register of Historic Places.

Chamber of Commerce Building:

This Steamboat structure is a very classic Sternberg modern movement style. It is known as the butterfly building because of the inverted pitch roof. The building was designed to fit in with the

surrounding nature. He did this by creating a very horizontal design and using natural materials. Another unique way he did this was instead of cutting down existing trees in the site, he incorporated them into the design. He cut out holes out of the porch and roof for the trees. This project was a smaller scale than sternberg is used but follows his typical beliefs and style. The budget for this project was very low so volunteer work and donated materials were used.

In 2009 it was listed on the Colorado Register of Historic Places and in 2010 it was listed on the National Register of Historic Places

Yampa Valley Electric Association Building:

The building was designed and built in 1956. Along with the contractor Sternberg worked with frequently, W.L. Pierce, they managed to design an attractive and functional electric building for thousands of people. There was also an addition built in 1964.

The company itself has a very interesting history. Originally the company began in an abandoned hotel. They began providing energy to around 100 clients. Then their popularity grew due to how dependable their electricity was and before they knew it they had thousands of clients. At this point, they knew they needed a professional building.

Sternberg also designed the manager of the company's house. Clearly the manager respected his work as an architect.

The Yampa Valley Electric Association had many aspects to it. It had an office building where the number and calls to clients took place, a garage meant for large trucks, and an elevated garage for the employees.

The building was initially designed for industrial, processing and extracting purposes and has maintained those uses to this day. That is proof of the durability that Sternberg's buildings possess. After this building was built the company's clients expanded exponentially.

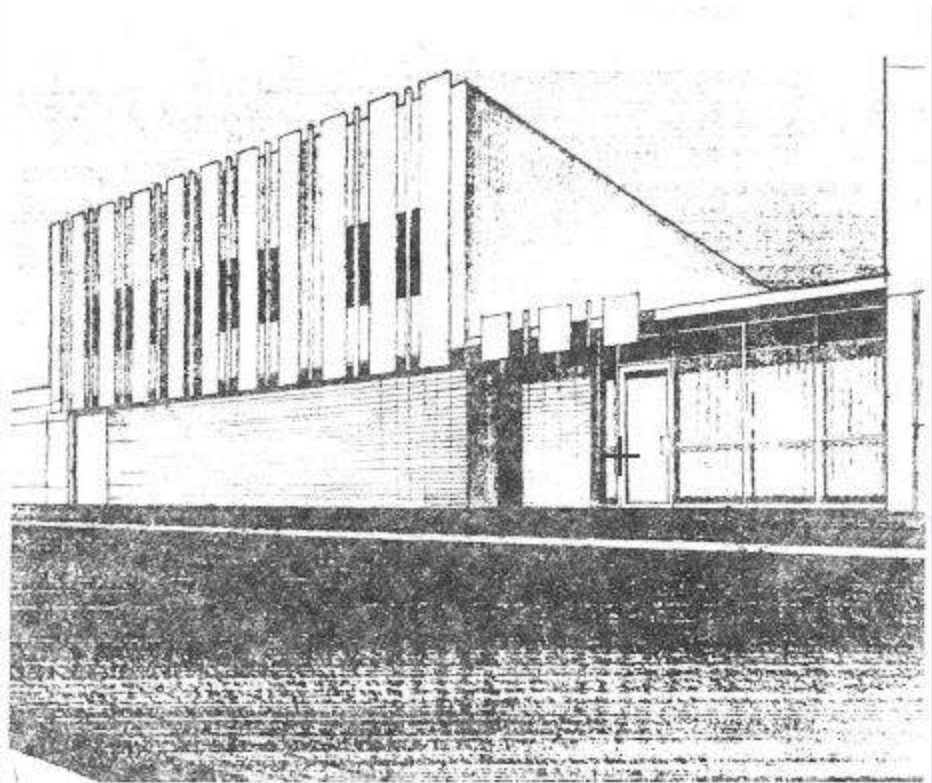

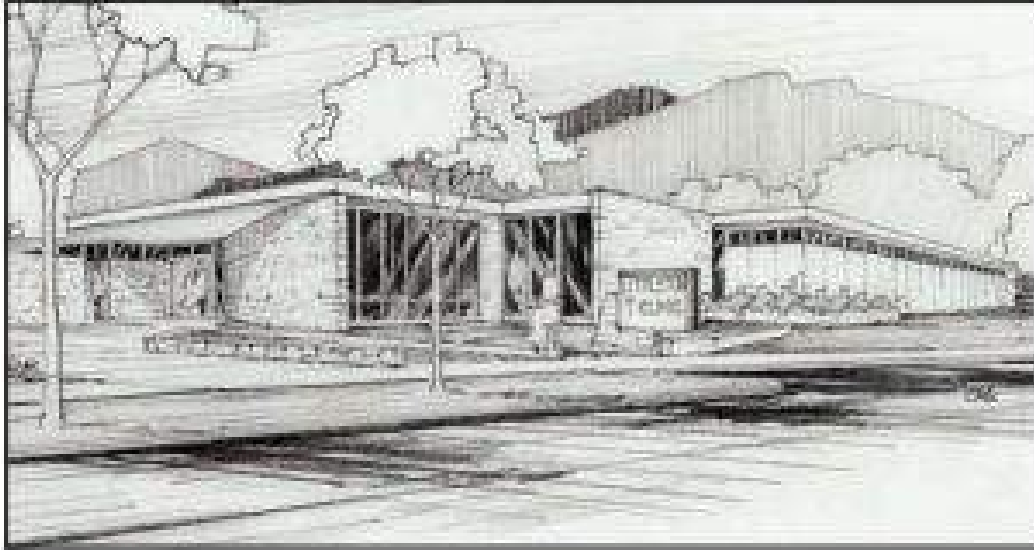

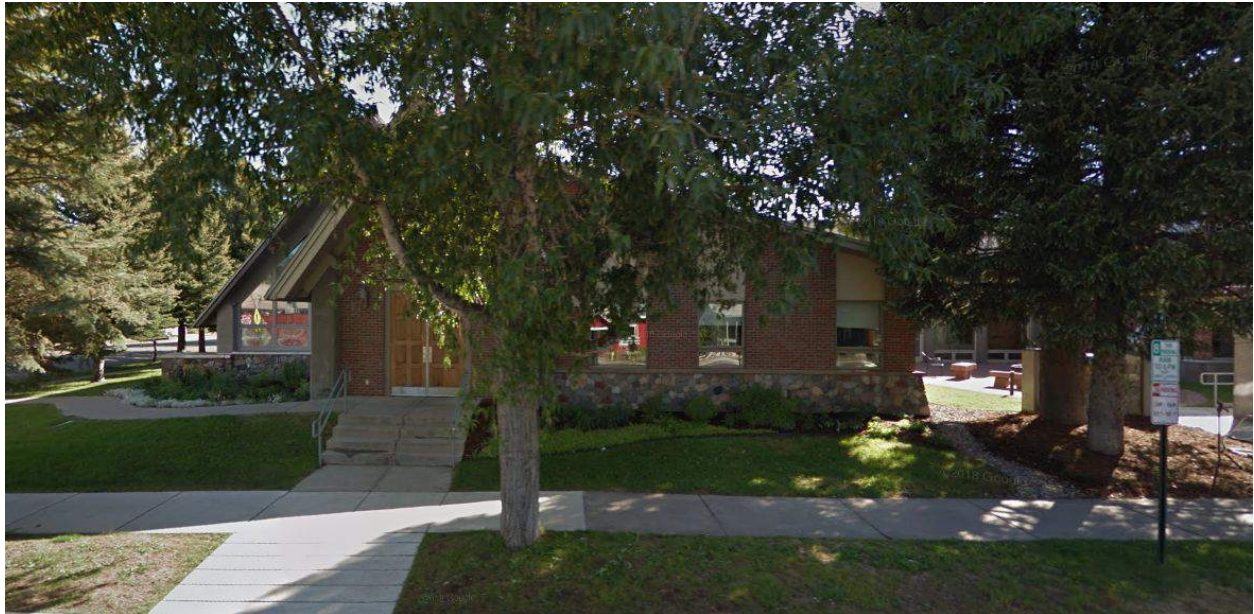
