## Jeremy Németh: Designing more inclusive public spaces

(2006-present)

- Public parks, plazas, and sidewalks are not universally accessible or inclusive. The ways in which we design and
  manage our public spaces suggests who we deem appropriate or desirable members of society. My work in this
  area has shown how public and private actors have historically sought to limit access to certain groups while
  limiting access to others, such as unhoused people, people of color, teenagers, protestors, skateboarders, and nonconsumers. This work provides guidance on how to make spaces more inclusive to a diversity of uses and users.
- This project resulted in numerous articles in peer-reviewed journals, editorials in national newspapers, edited journals, and coverage in the *New York Times*, *The Guardian*, and the *Associated Press*.
