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Does transport support parents and youth, allowing both more time and freedom?

Case study research

- School districts aren't required to provide transport. Many are cutting, reducing, charging, or **looking to public transit**
- In response: parents and advocates pushed for **free or reduced public transit** passes for students.

Policy solutions

Advocates see value of infrastructure integration (II) : *use public transit when yellow buses are cut.*

But II is not simple:

- Neither school districts or transit agencies have enough money
- Societal decision: fund safe and affordable youth transportation OR leave it to parents?
