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Executive Summary

Purpose of the Guidebook

The purpose of this project is to provide a guidebook for planners to learn what type of land use code language can be adapted for their communities needs in creating equitable access to healthy food.

The Problem

Often there is a challenge in translating goals expressed in comprehensive and long-range plans into applicable, practical land use code and planning regulations. However, there is no singular template, guide, or resource available to Colorado planners to aid in implementing food access goals through local land use code.

Methods Used

We used a health metric tool named City Health Dashboard, to determine what municipalities would be chosen for interviews to discuss their land use code. These municipalities have an average of 64% or more of residents who have limited access to healthy foods. We corresponded with five cities and four counties via email, phone, and zoom. The interviews focused on discussing examples of land use code language that improves food access.

Findings

The data collected from the interviews informed the development of a summary of best practices for land use code and food access outreach, a land use code checklist of questions for communities to consider when writing their code, and a toolkit of sample language to serve as a resource for how to write and implement a food focused code.

Recommendations and Next Steps

- Develop a comprehensive statewide toolkit for housing, open space, place and the built environment, transportation and community support.
- Collaborate with rural municipalities.
- Begin developing the chapter of the toolkit focused on transportation.
